

I look forward to meeting the Club members and working with the Board members in the coming years.





nce again we are going to Denver Indoor Kart Racing (formerly known as "TBC Indoor Racing") to race the Go Karts. It will be on Saturday, February 22nd. Arrival time is 9:00 AM with the driver's briefing starting at 9:15 AM sharp. The race will start at 9:30 AM. DO NOT be late. This year we will be running a 90 minute timed race; and there will be a *limit of 36 people* (6 teams of 6 people). Unlike last year, there will not be any 'practice' before the race. Feel free to visit them a few days in advance if you want to practice and get acquainted with a racing kart. The karts are actual full size European racing karts.



Sign up is first come first serve, so send in your registration immediately. Each member may bring one guest. The cost will be \$40 per person. Each team will be six randomly selected people. If you have a guest, you will be placed on the same team.

Denver Indoor Kart Racing is located at 4351 E 46th Ave., Denver. That is at I-70 and Colorado Blvd. on the NE corner just east of the Eagle Claw warehouse. Prepare to AutoCross

his year the Rocky Mountain Chapter has scheduled 8 autocrosses and one autocross school. Six of these events will be sponsored by **Bimmer Haus Performance**, as a Series. This means if you participate in at least four of the six "Series" events, you will be eligible for year-end trophies in your class. We are very proud to have **Bimmer Haus Performance** sponsor this Series. One of the year's events will be an autocross school, which will be limited to 40 drivers. The other two events, this year, will be winter events and will be held during the first quarter.

WINTER EVENTS

If you have not participated in one of our Autocrosses and feel a bit apprehensive, we would encourage you to come out to our winter events and get to know the sport. The winter series events will be run very similar to the Series events, but there will be no competition for trophies. You will really enjoy getting out and preparing for the season, as well as the camaraderie. Each day of runs will allow you to get familiar with an autocross course and allow you to get a bit more comfortable with the sport. SCHOOL EVENT

The idea behind the school is to teach students what some of the keys to Autocrossing are and how to prepare to compete. There will be NO COMPETITION, just a fun filled day of learning. Lunch will be provided.

SERIES EVENTS

PREPARE YOURSELF FOR THESE EVENTS

- Plan to show up early and check in upon arriving Get your grid assignment, pay if you owe, and pick up your lunch and drawing tickets. There is always a tent setup to house all administrative functions; this will be the spot to take care of all event business. Please do not go to the trailer to ask questions. The trailer personnel are usually very busy getting setup and planning a safe day.
- Make sure your vehicle is cleaned out and ready for tech inspection and get your car number put on as soon as you arrive.
- 3. Get your car to grid as soon as possible. Tech inspection is done in grid.
- Participants are responsible for their own belongings. If you bring valuables, please have someone watch them, while you work or run. RMC BMW CCA is not responsible for lost or stolen items.
- 4. No racing, fast driving, or showing off in the pit, staging or grid areas. Save your fast skills for the course. Anyone found burning out or driving fast in the pits or grid area will be asked to leave the event without refund. There are no exceptions! Safety is our primary goal at any RMC BMW CCA event.
- 5. Spectators are allowed but cannot be in the "hot" areas.
- Every registered driver will have a work assignment if they are not driving or resting.
- Bring water. Even if it is not hot out, you will dehydrate quickly. Some water will be provided.

You may go online at www.rmcbmwcca.org to register, class your vehicle and request a season number or simply obtain more information. If you do not request a number, one will be assigned to you. The number you pick will follow for future Autocrosses through the year. A note to previous participants: You will need to re-class your vehicle, as a few system changes have been made since last year.

These events are open to all BMW CCA members and their families. Non-members will be put on a waitlist. We will begin filling spots for non-members 3 days prior to the event. Registration for all events will close 3 days prior to the event. Registrations that are received after the cap has been reached, 100 for series and winter events and 40 for the school, will be put on the waitlist. In the event there are no-shows for any event, we will use the waitlist or all walk-up's to fill those spots.

Beginners are welcome, as well as convertibles and roadsters. Helmets, rated Snell 90 or newer are required. The club also has a few loaners available. All drivers must have a valid driver's license and be at least 16 years of age.

Although Autocrossing is a safe sport, it is a timed event. As such some insurance policies may not cover your vehicle or harm that could result from participating. We recommend that you check with your insurance carrier to get more information.

Dyno or Not to Dyno

Il bet most of us don't know what our cars sound like at full throttle from outside the car. I know I didn't. Even though we would soon find out, that wasn't the reason five of us gathered at **Autosport Werks** in Broomfield, Saturday November 16th, 2002. No, we were on a quest to find out whether our tires could pulverize, shred, ripple or merely tickle the asphalt when the skinny pedal was jammed into the firewall. And we were going to use Autosport Werks'

Dynapack Chassis Dynamometers to get our answers.

The Dynapack is way up there on the list of slick devices. In a conventional chassis dynos, the car is cinched down, while its drive wheels churn a set of rollers. In contrast, the Dynapack consists of two (or four for the Audi or Subaru folks) "load cells", each about the size of a two-drawer filing cabinet lying on its side. These are essentially very sophisticated water cooled hydraulic pumps that are attached directly to the hubs of the drive wheels. The load cells "talk" to a computer, which calculates how much power the car, is putting into the load cells.

Among the advantages of a Dynapack machine are very accurate and repeatable readings, and the ability to "hold" a car at a specific RPM for tuning purposes. The big disadvantage is setup time. The

crew (Doug Schuler and Bob Pollo from Autosport Werks) had to jack the car up, pull the wheels, bolt these very trick adapters onto the hubs, and then finagle the ends of the adapters precisely into a small hole in each of the load cells. It takes a while, and a bit of grunting and shoving. In order to calculate the engine RPM, the dyno then needs to be calibrated with the car's final drive ratio. This proved to be a bit of a hit or miss operation on a couple of the cars — why the Dynapack doesn't get the RPM directly by reading the voltage off of a plug wire (like any \$25 timing light does) is a mystery.

Watching a run was kind of surreal. There are several industrial sized fans blowing on the front end of the car to keep the engine happy. A "pull" starts off when the operator floors the car at about 1500 RPM. The dyno lets the revs increase slowly (picture full throttle acceleration in 4th gear) until the engine reaches redline. The car isn't going anywhere, but it's pretty obvious by the way things are vibrating that it's working

very hard. You get a very good idea of what the rest of the world hears when you're running at full throttle.

In order, we had Dave Howe, in his son's modified Prelude, which snarled in a most satisfying manner. Then a real treat, Bryan Lancelot brought one of the immaculately restored 2002s previously on the cover of July's *Roundel*. For those who remember the article, it was the "track" car with Webers. The underside of the thing was cleaner than the

bodywork of my car. Sounded real good too. Arnie Coleman's 2000 M Roadster was next. Then my turbo M3, and last, Dave Walker's M540 (essentially an E34 M5 with the 4 liter V8).

There were a couple of interesting moments: First, was Dave Howe putting on his plumber's hat to fix a problem with one of the load cell cooling hoses. Then the diminutive nature of the M-roadster's wheelbase raised another issue: After getting everything hooked up, we discovered that the load cells were just long enough to prevent the doors from opening. The problem was solved by Arnie squirming through the window, and dropping the top, to the amusement of the rest of the party. Good thing it wasn't an M-coupe.

All in all, it was an educational experience. I learned that I still have some tuning to do — I'm losing top end boost, and running too rich. Thanks once again to **Autosport Werks**, Doug Schuler and Bob Pollo for running the equipment



What do you want to drive when you grow up?

hen I was a sixteen, I used to think that the ultimate daily driver would be a fully race prepared Porsche 911 turbo: stripped interior, no mufflers, and an ostentatious paint scheme. Essentially a very light, very powerful vehicle that would require the use of earplugs, jar your bones over the slightest road imperfections, and provide mind numbing acceleration from every green light.

At the age of nineteen, my uncle purchased Anthracite on black 1989 BMW 750iL. She was long, sleek, and luxurious with a large twelve-cylinder motor, she was fast. Coddled within that opulent interior with the radio turned up, I easily lost my sense of speed. Ninety miles per hour felt like seventy, and seventy miles per hour felt like a lazy Sunday drive. About that time something happened. I had a moment of clarity wherein my tastes transformed from basic boy racer to elegant executive conveyance. Brute strength had lost out to luxurious might. Then, within a matter of weeks, everyone in the family received speeding tickets while driving that 7 (including one for 145 miles per hour). In a bid to save our driving records, the 7 was sold.

Fast forward thirteen years, and my first speeding ticket since 1989 is again while driving BMWs latest flagship, the '02

745i. It hardly mattered though, as this aided the new 7 in bringing me back to 1989. I'm nineteen again, rediscovering the joys of a vehicle that, demographically speaking, I shouldn't be interested in for decades. I can't help it. The 745i and 745Li, the long wheelbase version, provide for high levels of driving prowess in a full size luxury sedan. The 745i accelerates forcefully and is deceptively agile. BMW engineers have figured out a way to morph the smaller 5 series into a larger scale adaptation of itself.

The 7 boasts a long list of cutting edge technology: electronic shock absorber damping control, six speed automatic transmission, bi-xenon headlights, automatic climate control and programmable cruise control, to name a few. Two new features make the 7 the driving enthusiast's choice: the 325 horsepower 4.4 liter, V8 motor and the Active Roll Stabilization system. These aspects of the new 7 combine to provide performance that beats that of BMW's own mid size sedan, the 540i.

The 745i and Li are endowed with a state of the art version of BMW's venerable 4.4 liter, V8 motor. Compared to its predecessor, this motor incorporates several new technologies. BMW's variable valve lift system, Valvetronic, eliminates

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the need for typically restrictive throttle plates. A fully variable intake manifold, which is electronically controlled to provide optimum intake airflow, provides for the most efficient power delivery at any given RPM. Thanks to advancements such as these, the new V8 produces 15% more horsepower, while returning up to 13% greater fuel economy. Accordingly, the 745i accelerates to 60 mph in 5.9 seconds, while the 540i takes three tenths of a second longer to reach the same mark.

Active Roll Stabilization (ARS) is a component of the 7's computer controlled suspension system that drastically reduces body roll while cornering. Depending on the severity of a bend, the laws of physics associated with the vehicles lateral motion (wherein centrifugal force shifts the weight of the vehicle to the outside of the turn) are counteracted by the vehicle's suspension. The ARS system's ability to keep the car level during such spirited driving provides levels of stability and nimbleness that deny the vehicles mass.

If the beauty of the 7 is in the driving, then what does it offer stylistically? The exterior design has garnered mixed reviews, particularly as it pertains to the trunk treatment. BMW's design boss Chris Bangle has made a bold statement with the exterior styling of this 7 series. Typically, bold statements aren't for everyone and they tend to polarize public opinion. I'll admit to being lukewarm on the styling, at first. However, with time the new shape has grown on me, particularly on the darker colors and on the Li's long wheelbase. In the end, it is all a matter of personal taste, as a flamboyant automotive designer once said, "We would be in trouble if we all loved the same woman."

The interior is plush, yet tempered with functionality, in typical German fashion. The fit, finish, and quality of materials befit BMW's top model. Leather quality and textures are superior, as are the woods and high-grade plastics. The switchgear and other driving controls (turn signal stalk, wind-shield wiper control, and cruise control selector) are all located easily within the driver's reach on the steering column. The instrument cluster and dashboard are unfettered by the current onslaught of buttons, knobs, and dials, thanks to BMW's controversial iDrive system.

You can keep up with the latest chapter news, and impromptu events, like the Bimmer Burger Nights and quickly organized drives in the mountains; argue over tires, wax, leather treatment, and Formula One results; and receive automatic reminders of official events on the Chapter calendar.

Situated on the front of the center console, within reach of both the driver and the passenger, is the iDrive controller. It is part computer mouse scroll wheel and part joystick. The controller, along with a centrally mounted display, manages, among other things: the navigation system, the stereo, advanced climate control settings, and advanced mobile phone settings. Basic climate control and mobile phone controls are still available via dashboard buttons, as are very rudimentary radio controls. The iDrive system has come under fire by many reviewers. I was able to get comfortable with the system in a matter of days (although, I do wish more of the radio controls were available outside of the iDrive interface). While a bit daunting at first, spending some time getting comfortable with the system, before driving, will help once you are on the road. If you are techno savvy, and know how to program your VCR, operating the iDrive system should become intuitive in short order.



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
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Hats Off To My Dad

y dear departed Dad was never interested in motor cars. All he wanted was something reliable that could cruise comfortably at the higher speeds. A Mercedes Benz fit the bill perfectly for him. He did a lot of traveling between a small county town called Wellington and the big city, Cape Town in South Africa. I never once saw him work on a car. He always filled up with petrol at the full service pump, made the attendant run through all the hoops, and then tipped him generously. I recall the petrol attendants producing their own hierarchy as to which one had the 'honor' of attending to my Dad. All his cars were professionally serviced promptly and in strict accordance with the owner's manual.

In 1965 he had a Mercedes that had a revolving column for a speedometer. It started out yellow in color, and then changed to yellow and red strips and finally it was all red, the top of the column would indicate the speed. Dad would do his duty in car pooling (lift club, we called it) every third Sunday. He would pick up myself and a few other kids at boarding school in Cape Town and then drive us out to our country homes. Back in the 1960s the roads were fairly deserted on early Sunday mornings. Dad would push that column into the red, higher and higher, until it filled the entire gauge, and then some. At that stage us kids would check it out, smile at each other and know that we were cruising at a hundred and plenty miles per hour. We never told Mom; that would spoil all our fun.

One day Dad was heading into Cape Town to trade in the old Mercedes for a new one. "Dad" I said, "BMW now builds cars in South Africa. Why don't you see how much they offer you for the Mercedes as a trade in for a BMW?" Well, the BMW dealer offered him more for the Mercedes than the Mercedes dealer would, so he came back in a brand new BMW. For the first time in his life he experienced something called acceleration. And he loved it. He also enjoyed flashing the headlights at other BMWs on the road. He never bought another Mercedes. It seemed that the older Dad became, the faster he drove his BMWs. I can say the same for myself. LeeAnne, my daughter is only 20. She already screams. Can you imagine her at 50 years of age? Slow down Lee!!

But before Mercedes and BMW, there was Studebaker, Nash Rambler, Desoto and even an Opal. I recall one particular memory very vividly. It was 1958, or so, and I was about 9 years old. Dad was crawling down the main road in Wellington, in his Studebaker. Mom was in the passenger seat

on the left and my younger sister and I were in the back having our customary fight.

The local farmers would send a farm tractor and a trailer into town every Saturday so that the 'folk' (farm laborers) could buy provisions. Well, the women would buy food and clothing; most of the men bought gallons of very cheap wine. Wellington was in the heart of South Africa's wine producing region, so wine was cheap and plentiful. In fact to this day, the laborers received a "dop" (large glass of wine) at the end of each days work.

So, ahead of Dad's Studebaker was an even slower moving trailer, packed solid with women and some inebriated men, hardly managing to stay on board. As Dad carefully approached the vehicle ahead, a gust of wind blew the hat off one of the men on the farm trailer. It landed on the road. Dad carefully aimed the Studebaker, and flattened the hat. My sister and I stopped our fighting to giggle at the moment.

"Clifford!" roared my mother, "how can you be so mean? That's a poor man and that is probably the only hat he has. Shame on you!"

Dad felt bad. We kids laughed. Mom glared at dad. He knew what he had to do.

He passed the farm tractor-trailer, drove on a short distance, then stopped the car. He then signaled the driver of the tractor to stop.

"Whose hat did I flatten?" my Dad asked.

"Mine Boss" said one of the men.

"Here" said my Dad. "I am sorry" and he gave the man five pounds. Well, five pounds to a farm laborer in South Africa back in 1958 was probably worth three months wages and a thousand times the value of an old hat. The man could not believe his eyes. He smiled from ear to ear.

Dad climbed back into the car. "Well, how much did you give him Clifford?" my Mom demanded. "Five pounds" my Dad muttered softly. He knew he was in trouble with the wife. "You did what!?" my mother exploded. "Why so much, we needed that money!"

We kids in the back shut up; it was Mom and Dad's turn to fight. We knew better than to interrupt mom when she was chewing Dad's head off.

The tractor-trailer passed us and when Mom was finished lecturing Dad, he slowly pulled back onto the road. As we approached the trailer a strange thing happened. All the men took off their hats and threw them in front of Dad's Studebaker.

"Clifford! Now look what you have done! Don't drive over any of them or we will land up in the poor house." We kids laughed again and Dad made sure he missed all the hats in the road, every single one of them. Mom smiled, Dad smiled and us kids were dumbfounded. We were a happy family once again.

Dad was a true English gentleman, with a great sense of humor and heart of gold. I have lots of fond memories and as many stories to tell, but this story is the only "car" story, so that is all that will appear in our *MotorSport Report*. I miss you Mom. I miss you Dad.

BMW Wins Two Awards in *Popular Science Magazine*'s Best of What's New Awards 2002

BMW's Sequential Manual Gearbox and Active Front Steering Both Honored

November 15, 2002, Woodcliff Lake, NJ... BMW received two awards in *Popular Science Magazine*'s 15th annual "The Best of What's New" roundup of technological innovations for 2002, which appeared in the December 2002 issue. The innovations that



received this honor are the Sequential Manual Gearbox (SMG) in the 2002 M3 and the BMW Active Front Steering concept.

SMG allows drivers to shift gears using paddles on the steering wheels, similar to a Formula 1 car, which allows quicker, more precise, shifting while retaining the efficiency of a manual transmission. *Popular Science* executive editor Bill Phillips described SMG, "In a year of new paddle-shift SMGs, BMW's is by far the best. And it's the most flexible we've ever seen..."

Another landmark innovation which Popular Science recognized is Active Steering. "The inevitable compromise: Responsive cars are twitchy at speed, while stable high-speed cruisers run slaloms like a freight train. BMW Active Steering ... takes a revolutionary approach: A planetary gearbox ... allow(s) a small electric motor to either increase or reduce the steering inputs from the driver." What this system means for the driver is more stability at higher speeds and easier steering at lower speeds.

BMW is a frequent winner in the Best of What's New, having won awards last year for the 2002 745i and the Street Carver, as well as countless awards in previous years.

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BMW Group NA Sales December 2002: BMW Group Ends Best Year Ever With Record Month

December Sales Up 43 Percent; Year-to-date Sales Up 20 Percent

WOODCLIFF LAKE, NEW JERSEY, January 3, 2003... The BMW Group (BMW and MINI brands combined) ended its best year ever with the strongest sales month on record, reporting December sales of 26,252 vehicles, an increase of 43 percent over the same month last year. (BMW Group set its previous monthly sales record of 23,994 vehicles in April of this year.) The company also recorded twelve-month sales gains of 20 percent, reporting 256,622 vehicles over the 213,127 reported in the same period a year ago.

BMW BRAND ALSO HAS BEST MONTH AND YEAR

BMW of North America, LLC reported year-to-date sales of 232,032 automobiles and Sports Activity Vehicles, up 9 percent over the 213,127 vehicles sold in the same period last year. The company also reported its strongest month ever with December sales of 22,974, up 25 percent over the 18,414 in the same month in 2001. (The previous record for the BMW brand was set in April 2002 when the company reported 22,435 sales.)

"This was the best year ever for 7 Series sales, as customers responded to the all-new model, which went on sale last January," said Ed Robinson, Executive Vice President - Operations for BMW of North America, LLC. "Sales of BMW models across the board were strong. In its last full year of production, we also recorded our strongest sales year ever for the popular 5 Series model."

BMW AUTOMOBILE SALES

BMW reported sales of 189,290 compared to the 172,505 cars sold in 2001, an increase of 10 percent. The company also reported December automobile sales of 18,949, up 34 percent from the 14,114 cars sold in the same month a year ago.

BMW SPORTS ACTIVITY VEHICLE SALES

Year-to-date, sales of BMW's X5 Sports Activity Vehicles were up 5 percent, to 42,742 vehicles over the 40,622 reported in 2001. For the month of December, reported sales of 4,025 BMW X5 Sports Activity Vehicles, down 6 percent over the 4,300 vehicles reported last year.

BMW CERTIFIED PRE-OWNED VEHICLES SALES

Sales of BMW CPO vehicles set records, too, as the company reported 60,610 vehicles in 2002, an increase of 52 percent above the 39,853 vehicles sold last year. For December, CPO sales were up 32 percent to 5,289 compared to 4,004 sold in the same month in 2001.

MINI BRAND / MINI AUTOMOBILES

In just over nine months, MINI sales in the U.S. exceeded forecasted figures for the first twelve months of sales. Year-to-date, the company reported sales of 13,903 MINI Coopers and 10,687 MINI Cooper S' for combined sales of 24,590. The company reported sales of 1,703 MINI Coopers and 1,575 MINI Cooper S' during the month of December for a total of 3,278 cars sold. The MINI brand has been on sale in the U.S. since March 22.

The Grand Final for the Challengers Louis Vuitton Cup: Oracle BMW Racing to Face Alinghi

Auckland/Munich. The starting gun for the Final of the Louis Vuitton Cup will sound on 11 January 2003. By that time the opponents will have experienced 102 eventful days since the first Louis Vuitton Cup race commenced on October 1, 2002. The two strongest Challenger teams, Swiss syndicate Alinghi, which is touted as the top favorite, and San Francisco based ORACLE BMW Racing have progressed to the Final – The winner of this best-of-nine race duel, will challenge the America's Cup title holder, Team New Zealand.

ORACLE BMW Racing's impressive display of boat speed and crew work in the Semi-Final Repechage where the team beat OneWorld Challenge by 4:0 raises hopes leading into the Finals.

"Alinghi certainly has good chances to win the Louis Vuitton Cup Final. However, we have learnt from our previous defeat against the Swiss team. The public can look forward to witnessing an exciting duel between two top class teams," says lan Burns, ORACLE BMW Racing Afterguard member.

Win or lose – BMW's record is a positive one even before the outcome of the Cup Final is known. "We started out as a debutant. Now we have reached the Finals of this high class competition. The whole team has performed magnificently and deserves to take part in the decisive races," according to Karl-Heinz Kalbfell, Senior Vice President Group Marketing, BMW Group.

What's in a Number??????

his time around we are going to look at something every BMW has, the vehicle identification number. What can it tell you about your car? The VIN number has a 17-character structure made up of numbers and letters. Hear is a typical VIN number WBABR3344YEA82019. The first three digits are the plant code. 4US is for Spartanburg, NCO is for South Africa, WBA is BMW AG, and WBS is MotorSport. The 4-7 digits are the model codes. To numerous to list. The 8th digit is the restraint system identifier. 0 is for seat belts, 1 is seat belts and driver airbag, 2 is seat belts and dual airbags, 3 is seatbelts, second generation dual front airbags, and 4 is seat belts, dual-stag advanced front airbags. The 9th digit is a check digit determined by VIN. This is usually an answer to a math problem. The 10th digit is the model year identifier, starting with A for 1980 and working though the alphabet sequentially for each model year. I, O, Q, U and Z are not used here. The model year 2000 was the end of the alphabet, so for model year 2001 the number 1 is used. Working from 1 to 9, and then in 2010 the letter A will be used and the process will be repeated. The 11th digit is the plant code. L for Spartanburg, A for Munich, B and D for Dingoling, E for Regensburg, and N for South Africa. The 12-17 is your cars sequential production number. BMW is always changing and up dating information, BMW may add or delete certain codes in the VIN. But the location of certain letters and numbers will be the same. Now everybody go out and look at your cars VIN and see what you can figure out from the vehicle identification number.
