

GOOD NEWS! REWARDS PROGRAM EXTENDED

Looking to purchase a new BMW? You're in luck. BMW CCA has extended the Rewards Program through December 31, 2003; all vehicles qualify except the Z8. Check it out in your monthly *Roundel* or the BMW CCA website at: http://www.bmwcca.org/services/svcfset.shtml

The basic guidelines remain the same – one must be a member in good standing of the BMW CCA for at least one year continuously prior to purchase, and one must file the documentation within 60 days of taking delivery of the vehicle. We have not received the updated forms yet, but understand that BMW NA has also included the Z4 in the program. Anyone purchasing a Z4 after January 1, 2003 – and fulfilling the other program requirements can apply for the rebate.



car of the month

Car of the Month is a series in which Club members will have a chance to showcase their pride and joy in the *MotorSport Report*. Our membership will see the variety of BMWs and the level of personalization that makes each car unique.

Each month throughout the year we will feature a "Car of the Month". Any car owned by a Chapter member is eligible. Just send several photos (they will be returned to you) of your car, along with a written description about the vehicle. But wait, there's more! In the February issue you will find a ballot to choose from the 11 Cars of the Month, and a Car of the Year will be announced in the next issue.

Our June Car of the Month comes to you from Aurora, Colorado belonging to Mitch Seward.

I found my 1997 silver BMW M3 by accident...literally. I purchased this pre-driven ultimate driving machine in mid-November 2002 because I needed a new car. My previous car, a pristine and highly modified, white 1995 BMW M3 (with a transplanted 1997 3.2L M3 engine) had been totaled in a wreck.

The accident was not my fault. A Ford F-150 driven by a man, who apparently thought it was more important to look for his misplaced cell phone than keep his eye on the road. He blew threw a red light at 45 mph and hit my M3 almost head-on as I was proceeding through the green light.

I purchased this 1997 M3 car to replace my recent loss. Not even 3 weeks after buying this car, much to my dismay, I was involved in a similar accident (head on collision-again, not my fault). After 6 weeks being expertly reconstructed at *Auto Image* in Littleton, Colorado and a repair tab close to \$10,000, the M3 emerged looking showroom new. The body shop did a fantastic job of putting this car back together — all OEM BMW parts, flawless welds, and a factory quality paint job.

Now it was time to have some fun! What started out as a stock M3, but was to be quickly transformed. The windows received dark tint and then the car spent a couple of days at *Autosport Werks* in Broomfield, Colorado, where it received a Dinan software upgrade, a Dinan carbon fiber air intake, new Bilstein shocks, and H&R sport springs. They also transplanted a few of the salvageable parts from the wrecked 95 M3 into the new 1997 M3. This included a UUC short shift kit with a Rob Knob II shift knob, stainless steel Borla cat back exhaust, European M3 2-piece floating rotors, braided stainless steel brake lines, and EBC Green Stuff brake pads, and lightweight SSR Integral wheels (8x17 front and 9x17 rear) with 245/40/17 Michelin Pilots.

Other upgrade items include: clear corner lights, clear turn signals, European front license plate, Racing Dynamics front stress bar, factory style M3 rear spoiler and custom stereo.

Future "needs" include: Dinan throttle body, Dinan air flow meter, ZKW European projector/angel eye headlights, X-brace, black out kidney grill covers, rear red and clear tail lights and possible upgrade to 18" SSR GT1 or 18" Breyton Inspiration wheels.





Mitch Seward's Silver 1997 M3


Springtime Car Care Quiz


AUTOCROSS - Winter Warm Up - Coors Field

am embarrassed to say I have never participated in an autocross even with my membership in the Rocky Mountain Chapter BMW CCA dating back to October 1980 (my member number was lower then). Up until now, my involvement has been limited to 5 or 6 driving schools and a few social events. I have been more of a lurker in the organization, until Saturday, April 12, 2003 that is. WOW! Ten BMWs have rolled through my garage (don't worry I still own a '92 535i) but, a 2003 MINI Cooper pulled in on December 11, 2002 after a long anticipated wait.

The autocross was beckoning me since before "Red Rover" arrived. Dave Bunting, Randy Webb, Mark Ferguson and Kelly Peterson's rousing adventure in last October's autocross and subsequent write up in both the *MotorSport Report* and the MINI5280 inaugural newsletter were both encouraging and challenging to my psyche. I doubt I could approach their results, but I would enjoy trying. I knew at that time I had to take a shot at this activity.

For you veterans, this is not new news in any way, but let me just say to those of you who think it's all about a road course or Second Creek Raceway, think again. Yes, the road course has its allure and certainly higher speeds, but in my mind the techniques and skills required in an autocross exceed the racetrack. Don't misunderstand me. I think driving the track is a ball and requires tremendous skill to do well. The pace at which things happen in a closed autocross course is almost exactly twice that of a track day or drivers' school, and frankly, unless you are Club Racing against like vehicles, you will never know (nor probably care) how you match up at the end of a day. I have thoroughly enjoyed my track days with RMC BMW CCA, and I have been able to drive on courses that don't exist anymore (remember Continental Divide Raceway?). My skills as a driver were definitely improved at these schools and by the talented people who instructed them. I also recognize that these two types of events (autocross, track days or drivers' school) are decidedly different in appeal and emotion. All I can say is if you haven't tried both, then you haven't lived.

Autocross, hmmm.... I thought, "What's the big deal?" I can drive around cones and certainly the fastest way is the shortest, so stay next to the cones without knocking them "out of the box". Anyone should be able to be fairly proficient... right???? Wrong!!!!! As a famous driver once said "Go fast in





the fast places and slow in the slow places". I decided after my first event that this quote needs some more study on my part to fully understand where the fast and slow places of an autocross course are and then how to recognize them without having driven them before. Sometimes, what looked like the fast places to me were really the medium pace places and some of the slow places didn't get my full attention until the end of the day because my adrenaline was running on full tilt most of the time. The fast places?? Well, I doubt I recognized them at all since I never really ran a good time. But, speaking of good times, if you can't have a good time doing this with a BMW, MINI, Corvette, old modified Volvo or whatever you have access to, then you're just not a car person.

Really, the competition is more than welcoming and friendly. The personalities are endearing, and the fun... well the fun never stops long enough to let me think, "How can I make that transition without spinning out this time?" "When will I ever make a decent pass at the slalom???" "When is lunch?" "How can I save some time on the 360?" All of these questions and more plagued me, and yet I had more fun than I can remember. Everyone is so friendly and helpful that even a loner like myself can't help meeting people and interacting with those waiting for a turn or watching their friend or just watching on a beautiful day. It was almost as much fun to watch, as you "work" the course. Frankly, I am sure I could have learned more if I had been paying attention to the "hot shoes" but, I was so enamored just watching how fast they could go that all I could do was grin or giggle most of the time. And for those of you who may have thought your performance was less than stellar... I bow and say "I am not worthy, I am not worthy" for

probably more time and several more events will be required by me, before I'll even approach your skill level.



"Pig in a Poke"

Bill agreed to keep the car in his garage and I agreed he could take it for an occasional spin. What are good friends for? Good friend, indeed, Bill kept my car for over 5 months until my return. I would like to take this time to thank Bill and his very understanding wife, Lisa, who by the way parked her mini van in the driveway to make room for my car in the garage, THANKS.

In the past two years of ownership, I have put 12k trouble-free miles on her, swapped the Dinan chip for a Conforti one, installed a K&N air filter, Magnecor ignition wire set/loom, Tri-Flow exhaust, upgraded the suspension with Bilstein Sport shocks and H&R Sport springs, fitted an Eibach strut bar, 17 in BBS RX with 225 40 17 Nitto NT 555 tires, BMP cross drilled rotors, replace all the hoses/belts, and installed a new cap and rotor.

By the way, the pig in a poke turned out to be the car I've always dreamed of. So much for that old saying!



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Paintless Dent Removal



Dent Wizard Tech Session

he Rocky Mountain Chapter BMW CCA had approximately 47 BMW car enthusiasts who came together on Saturday, March 29, 2003, for the Dent Wizard Tech Session, at one of the local Dent Wizard's locations — 6500 South Broadway, Littleton. The entire Dent Wizard staff was very helpful and great to work with. They greeted our chapter sincerely, and provided us a great brunch, which included muffins, bagels, fruit, coffee, tea, juice and many packaged gifts to take home.

The technicians demonstrated the magic of paintless dent removal. This was my first experience with this process. I, like many others, stood in astonishment as to the magic which took place. If you ever need a dent removed, I would recommend this shop, as the technicians did an outstanding job.

The technicians had a very busy day removing dents from 14 different BMWs (some with only one dent, others with up to 10). The dents ranged in size from very small to very large. We had 7 car enthusiasts who received an estimate

and setup their future appointments. Dent Wizard was kind enough to give everyone a 20% discount for all work done the day of the event, and also for all future appointments set the day of the event.

Below are some of the members' dent removal experiences:

1995, 325i, **convertible**, with sport package, purchased new, 54,000 miles.

Dent on driver's door was about 5/8" long (horizontal), 1/8" wide (vertical), and between 1/16" and 1/8" deep at its

deepest (most forward) point — located just above the rubber side molding strip, which is intended to protect against these kinds of things. It was apparently caused by another car door, in a parking lot - one of those things that was not there when I parked the car, and OHHH #*?#@&*, when I returned to it some time later. Of further note, the paint was also broken (essentially gouged out) in the dent.

The technicians said it was exceptionally difficult to deal with, because the metal was badly stretched at the deepest (forward) section of the gouge. He was also concerned that because the paint was "broken," it might crack and flake off, as the repair work progressed.

In the end, he was able to get the area completely flat again. There remains a small strip without paint, but, because it is now essentially flat again, it has become far less noticeable than it was. I purchased a touch-up kit at **Ralph Schomp**, and am going to see what I can do to touch it up, but that's another chapter.

The Dent Wizard Tech Session was enjoyable today. Thanks very much for your efforts to organize it, Darlene.




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Colorado Sleet Clinic

ar Control Clinic, or more appropriately Colorado Sleet Clinic. I recently participated in the Car Control Clinic that is mandatory for all drivers participating in the Ralph Schomp Driver's School on May 3rd and 4th. Aside from it being cold, windy and down right miserable, it was extremely beneficial.

I have read many times before about how you can steer your car with just the throttle. I realized this first hand on the skid pad. I also came face to face with understeer and oversteer. I then had my turn at the two slalom courses set up.

The first course was designed to let you feel how the ABS system worked at the end of the slalom. Of course, I am already very familiar with this because I drive I-25 on a daily basis, enough said! The second slalom course helps you understand that while the ABS is doing its job, you can still steer the car and be in control. My first time through the slalom was interesting, I had Bob Sutterfield as my instructor, and of course I had to nail two cones. Bob, being the patient and nice man he is, didn't make a big deal out of it. He told me that the first time is really a navigation run. After multiple times through the slaloms I became faster, smoother and was able to really understand how the car shifted weight and its effect on the limit of control I had. As a novice, I am always reading about weight shifting, and the various aspects of car control. It was invaluable to me, to finally be able to put theory into practice in a safe and controlled environment.

Thank you again to everybody who volunteered in the horrible weather to put on this excellent clinic.

I hope everyone had a great time. A few cones were feeling the effects of being run over; but they're used to it!

The students had a blast running through a couple of slaloms and feeling their ABS in two different braking zones. Every five minutes the weather changed from rain to sleet to wind to sun back to more rain and sleet...repeat as needed. Typical Colorado weather. The moisture was great for the skid pad. It kept it wet the bulk of the day so that students could learn how simple weight transfer via throttle inputs can actually steer your car around in a circle. Easily the most valuable exercise.

I'd like to thank everyone who helped run this event. I couldn't have done it myself.

Singin' In The Rain

he tires of my 330ci hummed a tune as the back end slid out with a spray of wet gravel. The pelting rain had started up again, and I wondered if the wipers would ever kick in - but I dared not take my hands from the wheel to flip them on. As if it (the car) was chasing an imaginary rabbit like a greyhound on the scent, the nose of the car twisted out of the turn as I let up on the gas then wove back and forth as I alternated between accelerating and slowing. Like a madman I drove in a circle, widening and then tightening the curvature with every orbit. I grinned over at my passenger who seemed to have a white-knuckle grip on the door handle. "Turn it around and go the other direction now," he admonished me. He didn't look too well, but I complied anyway figuring that doing so might unwind him, and pulled a 180. Eventually I straightened out and my passenger departed, clearly glad to touch solid ground once again.

Thus ended my first Car Control Clinic a few weeks ago at the Arapahoe Park Racetrack. Between the cold temps, the wind, and the rain-sometimes-sleet, it was not comfortable outside the car. But the fun was to be had inside the car anyway, so I don't think anyone really cared (except the guys doing the tech inspections!)

Although I had driven in last fall's Bandimere Autocross, I wasn't really sure what to expect from the Car Control Clinic. I had read and re-read the Car Control Clinic instructions and description, hoping to understand exactly what was to be taught. I used to be a high school physics teacher and so I tried to get an understanding of what the car was trying to do, what the laws of physics were making the car do, and what the driver wanted the car to do, before even getting to the track. Of course, all of that went out the window once the car was in gear and the cones were coming toward me at speed.

I won't mention forgetting to shift out of first on the initial run through the slalom. I won't mention missing the S-curve in the second braking section because I wasn't really sure where the lane was (yeah, I should have walked the course before driving it, but it was raining, cold and windy...and I am a wimp). What I will mention is the exhilaration of taking the car for my 6th run through the track, and finally feeling like I knew what the car was doing, when to start braking (not until you are INSIDE the braking zone) and feeling like I had mastered the ability to steer through the S curve while the ABS was pulsing. I'll also mention the exhilaration of driving in a circle around the skid pad and feeling the back end slide out, then pulling the reigns back in and getting it under control again – solely with the accelerator.

I don't feel like I'm an expert driver after the Car Control Clinic. But I do feel less anxious about the ABS kicking in, and knowing that my car REALLY can steer accurately through a turn while the brakes are locked up. More importantly, I seem to have this stuff running through my blood now (through my skin it looks like that blue brake fluid, I think) that makes me eagerly anticipate the Driving School in the next weeks. I can't wait to make the tires sing some more...

BMW Group Year-to-Date Sales Increase 10.4 Percent, BMW Group Sales Increase 0.6 percent in April

WOODCLIFF LAKE, NEW JERSEY, May 1, 2003... The BMW Group (BMW and MINI brands combined) reported a year-todate sales increase of 10.4 percent for 86,513 vehicles compared to the 78,386 in the first four months of 2002. April sales for the BMW Group were up 0.6 percent to 24,131, compared to 23,994 for the same month in 2002.

BMW BRAND REPORTS SALES

BMW of North America, LLC reported a dip in year-to-date sales of 1.1 percent for 75,209 vehicles compared to 76,040 in the first four months of 2002. April sales of BMW brand vehicles were off 6.4 percent at 21,010 vehicles compared to 22,435 vehicles sold in the same month last year.

BMW AUTOMOBILE SALES

BMW's automobile sales were up 3.6 percent year-to-date to 64,183 versus 61,958 in the same period a year ago. April sales were relatively flat for 18,294 cars compared to 18,349 reported in 2002.

BMW SPORTS ACTIVITY VEHICLE SALES

Inventories of BMW's X5 Sports Activity Vehicles remain lower than normal, and that is reflected in sales of the vehicle. BMW reported a 34 percent decline in April sales for 2,716 vehicles compared to 4,086 posted in 2002. Year-to-date, SAV sales are off 22 percent with 11,026 vehicles reported compared to 14,082 sold in the same period in 2002.

CERTIFIED PRE-OWNED VEHICLE SALES

BMW reported April sales of 6,204 vehicles, making this the strongest CPO sales month ever and eclipsing the previous monthly record (5,702 units reported in August 2002) by more than 500 vehicles. April sales were up 16 percent over the 5,358 units reported in 2002. Year-to-date, CPO sales were up 15 percent with 21,408 vehicles posted compared to 18,653 in the same period a year ago.

MINI BRAND

MINI Automobiles

Demand for MINI brand automobiles remains strong. MINI USA reported April sales of 3,121 automobiles compared to 1,559 sold last April. Year-to-date, sales of MINI automobiles totaled 11,304 compared to 2,346 sold in the same period of 2002. MINI went on sale in the U.S. on March 22, 2002.

Springtime Car Care Quiz Answers

- True. You may be throwing away a third of your tire investment by driving with under inflated tires. Incorrect wheel alignment is another factor in premature tire wear.
- 2. False. It's a good idea to check the air filter every 6 months or 6,000 miles and replace it as needed or at least every 24,000 miles. The air filter traps dust and dirt from the air before it can enter the engine. When the filter dirty it partially blocks airflow, causing the engine to run poorly, waste gas and pollute the air.
- 3. All three are correct. Most vehicles now are equipped with a single drive belt that operates all belt-driven accessories. It should be inspected and replaced when it shows signs of wear or deterioration.
- 4. False. That's seldom necessary if the engine and emission controls are properly adjusted and in good condition. Eventually, on a high mileage engine, carbon accumulation in the engine might cause some "pinging," but first invest in an engine checkup.
- 5. False. Continuous overloading can weaken springs. Special load carrying or booster shocks can help support limited overload weight, but they cannot replace weak springs. 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


