

am thrilled to announce that our chapter will be hosting its first Street Survival™ Safe Teen Ďriving Program on March 13th at Bandimere Speedway in Morrison. The Street Survival program is organized by the BMW CCA Founda-

tion, a non-profit organization established to provide a "significant repository of BMW information and to foster educational programs for the automotive community," according to their web site, www.bmwccafoundation.org/history.asp. The Driver Safety School Program describes their driving emphasis:

"Hoping to reduce accidents, injuries and deaths, the DSS [Driver Safety School] Program promotes and conducts educational projects to improve the car handling skills of young drivers, especially teenagers. The DSS Program is headlined by the "STREET SURVIVAL Teen Driving School" that is conducted in various parts of the US."

Last year there were eight Street Survival classes taght across the U.S, including one at the Michelin Test Facility in South Carolina. This year, national-level sponsorship is being provided by Liberty Mutual, BMW NA, and (probably) Michelin. Visit http://streetsurvival.org/dss_index.asp to learn more about the program.

While the BMW CCA Foundation provides the curriculum, educational materials, and professional support, the program relies on local volunteers to run the event. We are grateful to Bob and Lauri Sutterfield for taking the initiative in coordinating our event, along with literally dozens of club members who have graciously offered to help out as driving coaches and support staff. The response has been overwhelming, and it speaks volumes about the dedication of our club's members to young driver education and safety.

We hope to see many of you there on Saturday the 13th, whether you're a participant, coach, other volunteer, parent, or just interested in watching the program live. We all look forward to this worthwhile program becoming an annual event for the Rocky Mountain Chapter.

Our March Car of the Month comes to you from Colorado Springs, Colorado belonging to Rick Meinig, who writes:

1939 BMW 327/28

very car enthusiast harbors the fantasy of discovering the "ultimate car" in some barn or widow's garage. My acquisition and restoration of a BMW 327/28 had its genesis on a sunny spring day in 2001, when I was asked to give a tour of Colorado Springs to the visiting Team Handball coach of the Republic of Georgia. Tomas Antadze was at the US Olympic Training Center studying prospects for a coaching position in the USA. I had no idea that there was a sport of Team Handball—let alone an Olympic event. I met Tomas in my 1971 2800CS. (It was a car that I rescued from neighbors when their garage was too full and the CS was relegated to a car cover and the driveway!). Tomas' first comment upon getting into the CS was, "You like old BMWs? We have many old BMWs in Georgia—the Russians have vacation homes in Georgia with many fine cars." Tomas said he would email some pictures of a pre-war BMW that he knew of in Tbilisi.

I hadn't given Tomas' comment much thought until a couple of months later, when he did, in fact, email some photos of an old pre-war BMW! The price seemed ridiculously low and the story of the car was so interesting—a Russian Army officer supposedly took the car from a German officer during

WWII. The car found its way to Tbilisi, Georgia after the war and was later "restored" by a local gentleman. The original engine was replaced with a Volga motor and there were other assorted extra parts.

Over a period of 6 months, I became familiar with the bankrupt and somewhat corrupt bureaucracy of the Republic of Georgia as I paid for mysterious documents and certification fees. Our State Department was of little help thinking that I was dealing with the <u>state</u> of Georgia and not the <u>Republic</u> of Georgia! In time however, a 1939 BMW 321 did arrive in Colorado Springs. I was excited that I had pulled it off, but at the same time overwhelmed with what would be a major restoration. In the months of wrangling to get the car imported, I had done my homework on vintage BMWs. I "discovered" what is obvious to any non-car enthusiast—restoration of an old BMW would be expensive and time-consuming labor... The cost of a correct motor would be more than the cost of the car!

As I was mulling over the prospect of restoring the 321, I fell in love with everything that I had read about the BMW 327!! The 327/28 was produced in 1937-1941 with only

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569 being manufactured. The 327/28 shared the same 6 cylinder, 80hp motor as the famous 328 roadster that was so successfully raced in Europe. Out of curiosity one evening, I logged on to the *Hemmings Motor News* website to see if there were any vintage BMWs. A new listing was posted 10 minutes earlier describing a "complete and running" 327 with an "interesting" history. I contacted the owner, who said I was the first responder, and I could come to Chicago to see the car—no sale to anyone who wouldn't inspect the car. The car was part of a 65-car estate sale.

In the hour that I ruminated on when, if, or how to get to Chicago, there were numerous other inquiries about the car. It was clear that I was driving to Chicago that weekend with an enclosed trailer in hopes this was the CAR! When my co-driver Fred Feiler and I arrived at the Chicago garage after an all-night drive, we immediately sensed this was a special car. It was certainly a diamond-in-the-rough with its poor paint, dilapidated interior, and derelict convertible top frame. However, the motor immediately started and it had all the major parts.

As I poured through the paper work, it was apparent this car was deserving of a proper restoration. Among the papers was a 1980 letter from BMW AG stating that according to company archives, this 327/28 was specially prepared for the BMW motorcycle racer George "Schorsch" Maier. Perhaps the car was given to Schorsch for winning the 1939 Isle of Man Race. The war-time history and post-war history remain unknown. In 1980, the prior owner began something of a restoration. The car had a 1984 Indiana license plate and numerous Swiss receipts for motor parts from the

early 1980's. It would seem that the prior owner had done a mechanical motor restoration, had the car licensed, and then inexplicably stopped the restoration. If ever there was a vintage BMW in my future, this seemed to be the car....

After bringing the car home to Colorado Springs, I again had feelings of doubt as to whether I could manage or afford to restore such a car. Fortunately, the BMW vintage world is small and very helpful. I had lots of encouragement to proceed! The first decision on such a project is on what to restore.

There are plenty of opinions as to what constitutes a restoration. There are surely restorations that are of higher quality than when the car left the factory! I philosophically felt that I should restore the car to its original specifications whenever this was practical, and yet retain other authentic aspects of the car if they were historically correct. Certainly any 60+ year-old car would bear the modifications and foibles of its prior owners....

My kids and I enjoyed a summer of driving it to the Sonic Drive-In as I pondered restoration plans and learned its personality. I knew from the BMW archives, this car was originally gray. It was currently completely red—having a "Krylon" do-it-yourself quality as it sat in my garage. In the end, I decided on a two-color scheme—gray, in honor of its original owner and red, in honor of its more recent owners. The red and gray scheme was also practical as it meant that I didn't need to do a frame-off stripping.

I established working relationships with vintage BMW restorers in Switzerland, England, Germany, and the Czech Republic. I even had the good fortune of enlisting the aid of a fellow Vintage BMW Club member Jerry Lynch who lived in Boulder! In a matter of months, Bob Hill in Colorado Springs had the body prepped and painted. (I had the privilege of a key to his shop, so I could wet sand anytime the spirit moved me...). I found an excellent Colorado Springs upholsterer in Dale Trumbo who painstakingly rebuilt the Cabrio top frame and fabricated a pattern. I collected as many photos of restored 327s from around the world (Sweden, UK, Germany, Switzerland, Canada, and the US) to recreate a correct interior. Dale labored for months replicating the myriad details that I had researched.

By June 2002, the car was essentially complete and ready for the July Oktoberfest which was being hosted by our Rocky Mountain Chapter in Summit County. Since then, I've enjoyed the car on frequent weekend drives around town. My 3-, 10-, and 14-year-old children are my frequent driving companions, as well as, my detailers...my wife patiently allows me this passion! I've been slowly going through the ancient 6-volt wiring harness in hopes of improving reliability. My next goal is to drive the car in a classic vintage car tour such as the *Colorado Grand* or next year's planned BMW Vintage Marathon.

BMW Team PTG Returns to Rolex 24 at Daytona Looking for Third GT-Class Win

Winchester, VA - January 27, 2004 ... When the green flag waves for the start of the 42nd Rolex 24 at Daytona next Saturday BMW Team PTG will make its return to the Daytona International Speedway for its first 24-hour race since 1999.

While the race will mark the debut the BMW of North America, LLC-supported BMW M3s in the Rolex Sports Car Series of the Grand American Road Racing Association, it will also be a significant homecoming for Tom Milner's Winhester, Virginia-based team.

In 1995, the Rolex 24 at Daytona

was the very first race for the new BMW M3 effort and a BMW Team PTG M3 qualified on the GT class pole. The feat was repeated the following year as both Team PTG M3s sat on the front of the GT class grid with the M3 of David Donohue, Javier Quiros, John Paul Jr. and Peter Halsmer finishing third in class and ninth overall. BMW Team PTG posted back-to-back wins at the 24-hour race in 1997 and 1998. The 1999 season marked the last year a Team PTG M3 competed at the Rolex 24, giving the team a very credible two wins in five attempts.

"BMW Team PTG has had many successes in the last nine years we have campaigned the BMW M3, but there is still something very special about returning to Daytona for the 24 Hours", said Tom Milner. "Our first win in 1997 was not assured until the closing laps. With ten minutes left in the race we had to pit to replace the windshield and held our breath until the checkered flag fell. To win again in 1998 was equally rewarding and we are looking forward to getting the next one."

BMW Team PTG driver Bill Auberlen posted the second fastest GT time (1:55.121) around the 3.56-mile Daytona road course in the recent January Test Days.

"Certainly we will see when qualifying begins, but I believe we showed in January that we have not given up anything in the four years we have been away," added Milner.

Co-driving with Auberlen will be another longtime Team PTG driver, Boris Said. Both Auberlen and Said were members of the 1997 and 1998 Rolex 24 winning teams. New since 2003, Team PTG drivers Justin Marks and former Formula Atlantic standout Joey Hand, of Concord, Ohio, will be making their first Daytona starts for Team PTG.

"This will be the first time the latest-generation M3 will compete at Daytona and although we know our competition will be tough we are eager to see where we will be come 1 PM next Sunday," said Hernando Carvajal, M Brand and Motorsport Manager of BMW of North America, LLC. "We have nothing but the highest confidence in the M3 and the team."

2004 Formula One World Championship

he FIA has released the dates and venues for the 2004 Formula One World Championship. Bahrain and China are added to the schedule as expected, with Belgium also making a welcome return to form an 18-race season.


The 2004 campaign will open as usual with the Australian and Malaysian rounds, before the inaugural Grand Prix of Bahrain on April 4. The Brazilian race moves to October 24 as the season finale.

Imola will host the first European round of the year, the San Marino Grand Prix on April 25, while the United States Grand Prix switches to a mid-summer slot on June 20, forming a north-American double-header with the Canada on June 13.

Spa will host the returning Belgian Grand Prix on August 29, ahead of the final European round at Monza. The season culminates with three fly-away races, the first of which will be the Grand Prix of China in Shanghai on September 26.

Street Survival

Street Survival Teen Driving School

We read all too often in the *Post* about an area teenager who was out with some friends, lost control of the car, and rolled it into a ditch, with disastrous and mournful consequences. Traditional Driver's Ed teaches traffic signs and sometimes signaling for a lane change. For the tough situations that can cause the car to flip if not handled correctly, we just hope they'll last long enough to gain some experience and judgment. Adult members of the Rocky Mountain Chapter have the opportunity to participate in our excellent Performance Driving Schools, but how will our under-18 kids learn the driving skills they need?

The BMW CCA Foundation has created a one-day school to teach teens how to handle their cars safely. It's called Street Survival, to reflect its purpose: keeping our kids alive in their everyday driving on the streets and highways. It takes students from any starting point, to knowing how to handle their cars in any situation they can encounter. Teens use the same cars they drive every day, so the skills are applicable immediately. It could save them on the trip home after the event.

Street Survival is coming for the first time to the Denver area on Saturday March 13, 2004. At press time the loca-

tion is undecided, either Bandimere's west lot or a large lot in Aurora. The program is open to anyone from age 15½ to 19, with a learner's permit or a full license. 



A Fantasy Lap Around the Proposed 2.4-Mile New Road Circuit

ill Howard, of Plan West, with my help, has been designing and massaging ideas for the new motor sports park, which will replace Second Creek. Some of you at various meetings have seen what we have done so far. But only a relative few have been to those meetings. So I thought it might be interesting to imagine what it would be like to do a "make-believe" lap around the road circuit portion of the design. (There is much more available on the other end of the 320-acre site which accommodates a wide range of other motor sport activities.)

So let's fasten our seat belts, adjust our helmets and take off, clockwise, down the 1400-foot Start/Finish straight. (Bill and I spent considerable time designing the track so we can go counter-clockwise as well). This straight raises some 20-odd feet before we reach the brake-zone at Turn 1. (We may readjust the shape of Turn 1 to make it a bit more acute). As you leave Turn 1 you are heading gently downhill. You straighten out after getting through the very fast Turn 2 and then head uphill over a knoll. Once you cross the knoll, you will pick up momentum as

you head gently downhill until you rise some 20+ feet in the Turn 3 brake-zone. So you will probably be going full tilt all the way from the exit of Turn 1, through Turn 2 and into the brakezone for Turn 3 – some 3,000+ feet! (This straight is some 400 to 500 feet longer than Pueblo's!) But no fear, because the hill in this brake zone should present good, stable brake traction - as well as an opportunity to "out-position" your competition with a passing maneuver under braking.

Turn 3 will be great fun, because it rises on the approach and peels off downhill on the exit. The next section from Turn 3 all the way down to Turn 6 will be real exciting. Half way between Turn 3 and Turn 4 is a gentle knoll. So after you leave

Turn 3 you pickup downhill speed, level off briefly as you cross the knoll, and then plunge downward steadily approaching Turn 4, continue down through Turn 5 and then drop another 20+ feet into the brake zone for Turn 6. This 3,000-foot segment (from Turn 3 through to Turn 6) will see a lot of passing - especially so for the more experienced drivers entering the downhill braking/passing zone at Turn 6!


Because Turns 6 and 7 are located on a downward slope, we may have to cut into the hillside to avoid an off camber

> section. (It is tempting to leave it "off-camber" but you can just imagine how many cars would end up spinning wildly past Turn 6 trying to "claw" their way back uphill to Turn 7!) From Turn 6 through Turn 7, you are heading back uphill through 8A, 8B into Turn 9. We are thinking of making some slight adjustments in this area so Turn 9 would be faster and provide a driver more speed approaching the uphill passing/braking-zone entering Turn 10. This whole section from Turn 6 to Turn 10 is 3,000 feet and the skill a driver applies through this section should be very rewarding.

> > Turn 10 is a very tricky

"S" bend, which crosses a knoll. (This is the same knoll you crossed between Turn 2 and Turn 3 on the main straight.) You twist upward for the left-hand portion, straighten for 100 feet or so atop the knoll, then twist right and downhill as you come off the knoll. You will continue downhill slightly as you enter the fast left-hand Turn 11 (which we have named the "Carousel"). The radius of Turn 11 is identical to Turn 1 at Pueblo. This loop will be banked through a bowl-shaped depression situated below the Start/Finish straight (located some 300 feet away on the hill above). Because the terrain in the "Carousel" is not a perfect bowl, Turn 11 will have a certain "undulating" quality to it. Mastering the "Carousel" will reward a driver by giving them momentum approaching the Turn 12 braking/passing zone. The segment from the exit of Turn 10 to the entry of Turn 12 is some 2,000 feet long. Turn 12 climbs uphill in the same radius as Turn 1 at Second Creek. Getting the power down climbing through and exiting Turn 12 should give a driver a better chance of making a pass on the Start/Finish straight! So now you have completed one lap at "C.A.M.P.". (That is not the official name, but it sounds good! Dave Caswell suggested the name at the December SCCA meeting. It sure sounded good name to me! So I've been quietly promoting the idea since.) During this winter, we can enjoy dreaming of what the new proposed motor sports recreational facility will be. But to convert those dreams into reality, we'll have to buckle down and raise the money to make them come true!!


Dear Uncle Manny,




Hi everybody,

I hope everyone's holidays where full of joy and everyone is surviving the winter months okay. The weather here has been chilly on occasions, but of course, quite mild compared to Colorado. The mild desert winters here suits me just fine. I have this saying, "If you can't wear shorts outside, it's too cold."

Much has changed it the past two months and it's been all for the better. We are now eating two hot meals a day. The meals are brought in from Kuwait by a delivery van. The meals are sort of like airline food. They are pre-packaged meals in the little foil trays. Some are better than others, but at least they're hot. These meals are only temporary, while our mobile kitchen is being set-up. I would also like to report, that my digestive system has finally become accustom to this place, yee ha! We are still living in tents, but should start seeing our trailers by the time you read this. This is a change from my last letter. Originally, we where going to be living in remodeled Iraq Military buildings, but upper management (state side) decided that it would take too long to remodel them and opted for the trailers. All of us here would have rather moved into the buildings, as they offered more space per person.

We received our demolition explosives and have begun the daunting task of blowing up Iraqi captured munitions. Our current demo site is in located in close proximity to our compound and does not allow for large-scale deposal operations. Our current limit is 2000 lbs explosive weight. It's really not much, but at these distances, it's quite exciting. Our other demo site is about 50 kilometers from here and will have a 50,000 lbs disposal limit. Once the large-scale disposal starts, this is where we will be conducting our business. The military has changed its strategy on how they want us to deal with Irag's huge stockpile of munitions. We are now tasked with going out and cleaning up as many remote storage sites as quickly as possible; bringing the ordnance back to our Ammo Storage Point (ASP) for disposal at a later date. This will speed up the process of getting the munitions out of the bad guy's hands. Of course, this puts us on the road more and exposes us to more dangers. Unfortunately, it is still quite dangerous here, as we have lost another colleague. A female Army Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) technician was killed while trying to defeat a booby-trapped IED.

Our area is still fairly quite. We still receive occasional reports of bombing and shootings, but none has been directed at us, specifically. We did have an incident a few days ago during a convoy I was in. A car carrying 3 Iraqi's tried a blocking maneuver on the vehicle directly in front of me. This is a method the bad guys use to separate vehicles in a convoy to make them more vulnerable to attack. We have been briefed on this and have been told to do anything you can to get out of there. So, the driver of the vehicle in front of me rammed the car, spinning it around and into the median (hard!) When his wheels hit the median, the car flipped over on the drives door. It is much too dangerous to stop, so we spend off, most expeditiously. It was kind of scary, but it was sure neat to see the Ford F-350 smoking the wheels, pushing the car down the road sideways. The Toyota car was no match for the trucks we're driving. We haven't been back through that part of town since.

I'm starting to get excited about my up coming trip to Germany. I will be there for 8 days, starting the 31st of January. I have been there many times, but I have never been to the BMW Factory or the Museum. It's something I've always wanted to do, but never wanted to subject my wife to. She would cringe at the thought of spending a couple of days with me, looking at cars. Of course, I would have the same reaction if she asked me to go with her to some fabric store, yikes! Anyway, I will be spending a few days in Munich and a couple days at Ramstein Air Force Base visiting a friend of mine stationed there. Should be fun!

Well, that's all for now. I'll try to keep everyone informed on my adventures in next month's issue of the MotorSport Report. Stay tuned!

Exclusive to BMW in the U.S. market, Active Steering electromechanically varies the steering ratio on the basis of vehicle speed and other driving conditions. 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Successful 2003 Financial Year For The BMW Group

New sales volume highs for all brands, 3,000 new jobs created

Munich - January 27, 2004 ... The BMW Group has continued to perform well in 2003, keeping inline with its plan. With 1,104,916 BMW, MINI and Rolls-Royce Motorcars sold; the Group achieved a new sales volume record and surpassed the previous year's (2002) record of 1,057,344 units by 4.5%. As a result of the lower US dollar exchange rate, revenues fell by 2.1% to 41,525 million euros (2002: 42,411 million euros). Excluding the effect of exchange rate changes, revenues grew by more than 4%. The BMW Group was therefore able to strengthen its international position despite the difficult economic conditions facing some of the world's automobile markets.

Revenues for the automobile segment, at 38,285 million euros, increased by 0.3% compared to the previous year (2002: 38,179 million euro). For the Motorcycles segment, revenues fell by 3.8% to 1,087 million euros (2002: 1,130 million euros). The Financial Services segment generated revenues of 7,582 million euros, which are 9.1% lower than the previous year (2002: 8,342 million euros).

In light of the positive performance, the Group is able to confirm its earnings forecast for the year: "Current year earnings will match those of the previous year at a group level", stated Dr. Helmut Panke, Chairman of the Board of Management of BMW AG, in conjunction with the publication of the letter to shareholders for the financial year 2003. "During a phase of significant expenditure for the Group's product and market offensive, this is clear evidence of the underlying strength of the BMW Group and an incentive to deliver performances at the highest level in the years ahead."

More than 3,000 new jobs created

At end of 2003, the BMW Group had a worldwide work-force of 104,342 employees, 2.9% more than one year ago. After excluding the effect of disposals and transfers of group companies, the Group created 3,131 new jobs in 2003. The number of apprentices working for the BMW Group also rose again. A total of 4,306 young people are currently learning a profession throughout the Group, 2.5% more than at the previous year-end.

Capital expenditure increases

The BMW Group is laying the foundation for continued future expansion with high levels of capital expenditure. In 2003, the Group invested 3,255 million euros in intangible assets and property, plant and equipment. On top of that came development costs of 996 million euros which are required to be recognized as assets in accordance with IAS. Capital expenditure in 2003 therefore totaled 4,251 million euros. This represents an increase of 5.2% compared to the previous year (2002: 4,042 million euros).

A significant part of this expenditure related to the continued expansion of the production network. Most notably, the new BMW plant in Leipzig will generate a sharp increase in production capacity from the next year onwards.

All brands achieve new record sales volume levels

The BMW Group again achieved new sales volume highs for all brands. As a result of product life-cycles factors, growth picked up sharply in the second half of 2003. This was attributable mainly to the launch of the new BMW 5 Series, which became available in July 2003. By the year-end, 70,522 units of this model had been sold. In total, 928,151 BMW cars were sold during the past year, 1.6% more than in the previous year (2002: 913,225 units).

The BMW 3 Series, now in its sixth year of production and with 528,358 units sold in 2003, was only 5.9% below the record year 2002 (561,249 units). The total sales volume of the BMW 5 Series, at 185,481 units, was 7.6% ahead of the previous year (172,323 units). The BMW 7 Series achieved a sales volume of 57,899 units in 2003 and hence a new record for the model (2002: 53,504 units): the BMW Group has never sold so many BMW 7 Series cars in a single year as in 2003. Unit sales were up 8.2% compared to the previous year.

Demand for the BMW X5 continued at a high level in its fourth year after the start of production. Some 105,554 units were delivered to customers around the world in 2003, 4.6% more than in the previous year (2002:100,906 units). Within the roadster segment, the BMW Group more than doubled sales compared to the previous year. The BMW Z4 achieved a sales volume of 47,049 units (2002: 3,858 units) and thus leads the competition with approximately 40% of the relevant market. Despite its phase-out, 2,957 Z3s were sold in 2003 (2002: 20,277 units) as production of this model was discontinued according to plan during the year.

The performance of the MINI brand again surpassed expectations in the year gone by and contributed substantially to the sales volume growth of the BMW Group. With a total of 176,465 MINI brand cars sold, unit sales were up by

22.4% compared to the previous year (2002: 144,119 units). Bolstered by the introduction of the new MINI convertible, the MINI brand will continue its success story in 2004.

With Rolls-Royce Motorcars, the BMW Group has extended its range of products at the very top end of the luxury segment. By the end of 2003, 300 Rolls-Royce Motorcars were handed over to their new owners. After the initial start-up phase in 2003, production at the Goodwood plant has







now reached its planned capacity level within the scheduled timeframe. At present, five vehicles are being manufactured per day. A total of 481 Rolls-Royce Phantoms were manufactured in 2003. The BMW Group expects to sell approximately 1,000 Rolls-Royce Motorcars in 2004.

Production capacities still fully utilized

In line with sales unit growth, the BMW Group also achieved new record car production volumes. An incredible 1,118,919 BMW, MINI and Rolls-Royce Motorcars vehicles were manufactured, 2.6% more than in the previous year (2002: 1,090,258 units). Production of BMW cars was affected to an exceptional degree in 2003 by the start-up of new and revised models. The Group was able to carry out its ambitious program with the aid of flexible work-time arrangements and on-going process optimization.

Motorcycle unit sales again above previous year's level

The Motorcycles segment achieved sales volume growth for the eleventh time in succession despite difficult market conditions. BMW's motorcycle group sold 92,962 units during the year, 0.4% more than in the previous year (2002: 92,599 units).

Strong growth in the Financial Services segment
The BMW Group expanded its financial services activities

in 2003 and thus remained on growth course in this area. The volume of new customer financing contracts grew by 10.7% reached a new high level of over 710,000 contracts (2002: 641,638). The proportion of new BMW and MINI brand cars financed by the Financial Services segment increased in 2003 to 38.3% (2002: 36.1%).

Automobile sector expected to recover

On the basis of strong growth trends in the USA and Asia, the BMW Group anticipates that global economic recovery will continue to gain strength as the year progresses. As far as the euro region is concerned, however, it is doubtful whether the gradual recovery seen in this area will provide the necessary momentum to bring about robust economic growth. Overall, it is anticipated that the world's automobile sector will experience a modest revival.

BMW Group will continue on successful course in 2004

The BMW Group will continue to carry through its product and market offensive in 2004. With the introduction of the BMW 6 Series Coupe and Convertible, the BMW X3, the BMW 5 Series Sports Wagon, the BMW 1 Series and the MINI Convertible, the BMW Group is taking further important steps to expand its product range. The BMW Group thus anticipates that it will again be able to achieve sales volume growth in 2004; record levels are expected for all three brands.

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
